

Choral Introit: *Hosanna to the Son of David* Matthew 21:9/David Halls

The Liturgy of the Palms

All stand, having with them palm leaves and other signs of life, hope, growth, or renewal from their homes or garden, such as flowers in bloom, houseplants, a small tree, or a basket of fruit.

Celebrant: Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord.

People: Peace in heaven and glory in the highest.

The Celebrant continues

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy into the week in which we contemplate those mighty acts by which you have given us life and immortality, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Gospel Mark 11:1-11

Then, all standing, the Deacon or a Priest reads the Gospel, first saying

Celebrant: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

11 When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples ² and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. ³ If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this: 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.' " ⁴ They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside

in the street. As they were untying it, ⁵ some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" ⁶ They told them what Jesus had said, and they allowed them to take it. ⁷ Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it, and he sat on it. ⁸ Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. ⁹ Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

"Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

10 Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David!

Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

¹¹ Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple, and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

Celebrant: The Gospel of the Lord.

People: Praise to you, Lord Christ.

Celebrant: Let us pray.

It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed King of kings by the people, who spread garments and branches of palm along his way. Bless these flowers and fruits of the earth, that they may be for us signs of his victory and your grace. Grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. Amen.

Celebrant: Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.

People: Hosanna in the highest.

Processional Hymn: All glory, laud, and honor

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: Mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

The Liturgy of the Word

The Old Testament Lesson

⁴ The Lord GOD has given me a trained tongue, that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word.

The New Testament Lesson

Philippians 2:5-11

⁵ Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Iesus,

⁶who, though he existed in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be grasped,

⁷ but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, assuming human likeness.

And being found in appearance as a human,

- be he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross.
- ⁹Therefore God exalted him even more highly and gave him the name that is above every other name,
- oso that at the name given to Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth,
- and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

The Sermon: He Went Out

The Creed

Led by LEM, the People say:

- We believe in one God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible;
- And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, begotten of his Father before all worlds,
- God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father, by whom all things were made;
- who for us and for our salvation came down from heaven, was incarnate by the Holy Ghost of the Virgin Mary, was made human, and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate, suffered and was buried;
- and on the third day rose again according to the Scriptures, and ascended into heaven, and is seated on the right hand of the Father, and shall come again, with glory, to judge both the quick and the dead, whose kingdom shall have no end.
- And we believe in the Holy Ghost the Lord, and Giver of Life, who proceeds from the Father *and the Son*; who with the Father and the Son together is worshiped and glorified; who spake by the Prophets. And we believe one holy Catholic and Apostolic Church.
- We acknowledge one Baptism for the remission of sins, and look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Prayers of the People

The LEM says or Reader says

Let us pray for the whole state of Christ's Church and the world.

We pray for all God's people; for our bishops, our clergy, and this gathering, and for all ministers and people. Pray for the Church.

Silence

We pray for peace; for goodwill among nations, for justice, and for the well-being of all.

Silence

We pray for the poor, the sick, the hungry, the oppressed, and those in prison. We pray for those in any need or trouble.

Silence

We pray for all who seek God, or a deeper knowledge of God. Pray that they may seek, and pray that they might find.

Silence

We pray for those who have lost their faith, or who have never known it. Pray that God may open their minds, and grace move their hearts, to know and to follow Christ's way of love.

Silence

We pray for the departed [especially N.N.]. Pray for those who have died.

Silence

We pray for those on our prayer list, and for those whose needs are known to you alone.

Silence

The Celebrant adds a concluding collect.

Confession of Sin

If the confession is not omitted, the Deacon or Celebrant then says

Let us humbly confess our sins unto Almighty God.

Silence is kept. The People, led by the LEM, then say

Almighty God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, maker of all things, judge of all people:

We acknowledge and bewail our manifold sins and wickedness, which we from time to time most grievously have committed, by thought, word, and deed, against thy divine Majesty, provoking most justly thy wrath and indignation against us.

We do earnestly repent, and are heartily sorry for these our misdoings; the remembrance of them is grievous unto us, the burden of them is intolerable.

Have mercy upon us, have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; for thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may ever hereafter serve and please thee in newness of life, to the honor and glory of thy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Bishop when present, or the Priest, stands and says

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who of his great mercy has promised forgiveness of sins to all those who with hearty repentance and true faith turn unto him, have mercy upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Peace

The People stand.

Celebrant: The peace of the Lord be always with you,

People: And also with you.

The Ministers and People greet one another at physical distance.

Choral Anthem: My Song Is Love Unkonwn Crossman/Edwards

A Deacon or Priest, the LEM, and acolytes prepares the altar and sanctuary for the Eucharist.

The Holy Eucharist: The Great Thanksgiving

Celebrant: The Lord be with you,

People: And also with you.

Celebrant: Lift up your hearts.

People: We lift them up unto the Lord.

Celebrant: Let us give thanks unto our Lord God.

People: It is meet and right so to do.

Then, facing the Holy Table, the Celebrant proceeds

It is truly right to glorify you, Father, and to give you thanks; for you alone are God, living and true, dwelling in light inaccessible from before time and for ever.

Throngs of angels stand before you to serve you and offer you unceasing praise. Joining with them, we praise you, and glorify your Name, as we sing,

Then the Celebrant continues

We praise you, holy Lord, glorious in power, wisdom, and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that we might serve you in all your creatures. When we wandered from you, you did not abandon us. In your mercy you gave us aid, so that in seeking you we might find you. You called us into covenant with you, and through your prophets taught us to hope for salvation.

Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit and born of the Mary, his mother, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed redemption and release; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

Then, he sent the Holy Spirit to complete through us his work in the world, sanctifying and setting free all people.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it, and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon any vessel containing wine.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. At supper with them, he took bread, gave thanks to you, broke the bread, and shared it with them, saying, "Take, eat: This is my Body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." ‡

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this in remembrance of me." ‡

Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you this bread and this wine, fruit of the vine and work of human hands,

Celebrant and People

We praise you, we bless you, we give thanks to you, and we pray to you, Lord our God.

The Celebrant continues

Lord, we pray that in your goodness and mercy your Holy Spirit may descend upon us, and upon these gifts, sanctifying them and showing them to be holy gifts for your holy people, the bread of life and the cup of salvation, the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ.

Grant that all who share this bread and cup may become one body and one spirit, a living sacrifice in Christ, to the praise of your Name.

And grant that we may find our inheritance with Mary, the Mother of God, and with the patriarchs, matriarchs, prophets, martyrs, and all your saints. With them we praise and give you glory through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, all honor and glory be unto Thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. AMEN. ‡‡

Now, as Christ taught us, we are bold to say,

The People, led by the LEM, pray

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass

against us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Breaking of the Bread

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread, and then keeps a period of silence.

The Choristers lead the People in singing

Jesus, Lamb of God: have mercy on us.

Jesus, bearer of our sins: have mercy on us.

Jesus, redeemer, redeemer of the world:

give us your peace, give us your peace.

The Celebrant says

The Gifts of God for the people of God.

The People come forward to receive the gifts.

Communion Hymn: When I survey the wondrous cross Hymn #474

1. When I survey the wondrous cross where the young Prince of Glory

died, my richest gain I count but loss, and pour contempt on all my pride.

Send us now into the world in peace, and grant us strength and courage to love and serve you with gladness and singleness of heart; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Liturgical note: Palm Sunday begins the final week of Lent, and marks the start of Holy Week, the most sacred week of the Christian liturgical year. The service begins with a rite unique to this day: the Liturgy of the Palms, in honor of the palm branches that the people of Jerusalem spread before Jesus as he entered in triumph into that city. For this reason, our gospel reading comes before the opening hymn and the other readings of the day. They, like our hymns, lead us from the triumph of the palms to the grief of the cross, even as we prepare for the greater triumph of the empty tomb. May this service be a blessing to you. – Rev. Christopher
